President's MESSAGE

Spring is upon us and I'm pleased to report our Club continues to meet the challenges put before us by Covid and what's heartening is that we're seeing more and more Club Members enjoying all that Tatt's offers.

Whilst the Club has continued to support and assist its Members within the often changing restrictions, the Committee has focussed on plans for the future; plans to ensure the Club remains an important part of the life of its Members into the years ahead.

What is particularly encouraging is the steady and increasing inflow of new and younger Members, as expected after the recent change to the Club's rule on membership.

Also encouraging is the increasing use of the Club by more and more Members. The interest being shown in what we know to be a quite special place augers well for the future.

The trends in our new Member acquisition, combined with feedback from our existing membership over recent years, have seen the Committee decide on a plan to both improve what is regarded by many to be the best space in the Club and in doing so, continue to return space in the Club for Members' use. Our heritage areas of the Members' Bar and Dining Room remain the heart of Tatt's and will continue to be cared for with the respect they rightly deserve.

The plan will create a 'contemporary precinct' by refreshing the Healy Room and expanding the space to include the Library and what are the current staff offices on Level 1. This will deliver what Members have asked for,

will significantly improve the range of opportunities for Members, and give us all more reason to come and enjoy Tatt's. The two information nights held recently reinforced the thinking around refreshing that part of the Club so as to better provide for Members. This edition of Tattler includes more details of the precinct on which work will commence immediately after Christmas. The improved facilities will be open at the end of the first quarter of 2022 with construction occurring during the quietest period of the year. The CEO will separately outline how we will support Members during the construction period.

Racing remains an important part of life at Tatt's and the Club has made a number of significant changes to its annual racing program. The Racing Club has, after a sometimes challenging negotiation, reached a new three-year venue hire agreement with the Brisbane Racing Club and so will race at Eagle Farm on our February, June and September race days. Our Racing Club has also reached a three-year agreement with the Gold Coast Turf Club to race on their track in November annually, commencing Saturday 27 November this year. This will provide a wonderful opportunity for race-goers, Club and Sub Club members to gather, using RACV Royal Pines as our base, and enjoy a range of activities and so celebrate the end of the year 'by the sea'. The details of this event will come to you shortly and the Committee and I look forward to us gathering at what promises to be a wonderful weekend at the Gold Coast.

We anticipated 2021 would be a challenging year, particularly given the ending of the assistance of the JobKeeper program. I'm pleased to report we're performing better than anticipated and in a stronger financial position than forecast. As indicated at the Club AGM earlier this year, we are likely to incur a full-year loss, but careful expense management has helped soften the impact of Covid disruptions and the currently weak retail leasing conditions.

2021 has been perhaps even more disruptive than last year, with short-notice lockdowns and public health restrictions affecting us all. On behalf of the Committee, I offer our appreciation for your understanding. We're looking forward to 2022 and what we all hope to be a less disrupted, more predictable and so more enjoyable a year.

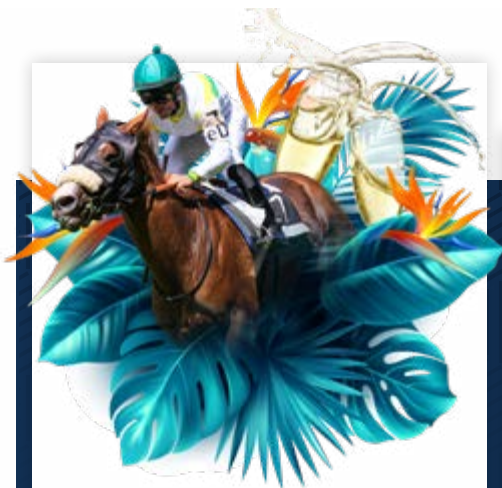

Business Series WRAP UP



Ita Buttrose does not pretend to have a secret recipe for her astonishing longevity in Australia's media industry.

She's been so many things in her professional career – revolutionary editor, Australian of the Year, health champion, television personality and now Chair of the ABC.

Ms Buttrose told a sold-out lunch for Tattersall's Club Business Series, presented by Mercedes-Benz Toowong and Macgregor, of her insights into a career that began in the 1950s.

And she channelled advice handed out by the some of her earliest bosses: Sir Frank Packer, Kerry Packer and Rupert Murdoch.

"Be prepared to take a risk, put your reputation on the line, get a big idea, make everyone believe in it and they will come with you," Ms Buttrose told the audience.

She has been doing that for decades, reflecting on one of her breakthrough moments which came in Queensland in 1959.

Ms Buttrose received her first "byline" - the tag that identifies which journalist wrote a story - when covering Princess Alexandra of Kent's Royal tour of Queensland to coincide with the state's centenary.

It was one of the memorable early steps for Ms Buttrose in a career unmatched by any other Australian media performer for its diversity of roles, profile and impact.

Ms Buttrose was warmly greeted by guests, many of whom lined up after her interview to meet the woman who has inspired so many Australians.

Ms Buttrose also touched on her attitude to change as she described how she had adapted from a magazine editor to running newspapers and ultimately to her role as ABC Chair.

Ms Buttrose admitted that handling criticism was part of life at the national broadcaster, which added rich depth to the Australian way of life.

"You have to look at the entirety of what the ABC does," Ms Buttrose told the lunch. "There are so many things – our voice in the Indo-Pacific region, our education classes for children to name just a few – which are things we do that no one else would dream of doing."

And she had advice for business leaders on how to engage with the younger generation of employees bringing energy to workplaces.

"You have to consider the human capital in decisions that you make," Ms Buttrose said.

"Younger workers are different. We used to think in my day that no news was good news – if the boss didn't call you about something, you were doing ok."

"These days, younger workers like to hear from their managers. It's a different approach."

"But it's all part of change. I'm not against change. I embrace technology. I know it will lead us to exciting new areas. It's all part of the excitement of business today."

Ms Buttrose also spoke about the increasing numbers of female members at Tattersall's Club as she reflected on the changes women have experienced over many decades.

"We've come a very long way. Sometimes you have to look back to realise how far we've come," she said.

"We really have come a long way and now it's up to this generation of women to decide where they want to go with it all."

Ms Buttrose was among the high-profile speakers at this year's Tattersall's Club Business Series Lunches, including The Australian newspaper Editor-at-Large Paul Kelly and key Brisbane-based identities Graeme Newton and Geoff Hogg.

Mr Newton, the boss of Cross River Rail, and Mr Hogg, from The Star Entertainment Group, shared the stage at a lunch earlier in the year to discuss Brisbane's changing CBD.

Mr Newton told the crowd of major Brisbane business leaders how the city will transform by 2025 as major infrastructure is completed including Cross River Rail.

The opening of an underground station at Albert Street creates new opportunities for the city centre, including a new major access point for the likes of Star's Queen's Wharf complex which continues to rise out of the ground close to the Brisbane River.

Mr Newton and Mr Hogg were enthusiastic about Brisbane's positive change ahead of the International Olympic Committee's decision to award the 2032 Games to Brisbane.

Business Series **BERNARD SALT**



Australia's best-known demographer believes COVID-19 is like a comet that's crashed into planet Earth, reshaping our lives and our assumptions.

Bernard Salt said those waiting for Australia to go "back to normal" would be disappointed as the nation and individuals continued to ask significant questions.

Mr Salt will be the special guest speaker at the Mercedes-Benz Toowong and Macgregor Tattersall's Club Business Series lunch on November 25, talking about the trends emerging from COVID.

"COVID-19 is like a comet that's come out of left field and hit planet earth," Mr Salt said.

"Some people say that they just can't wait for this to be over. But I'm not sure it's going to be over.

"We're going to be a different version of Australia. We are going through an inflection point. We're changing our trade relationships. We're questioning our geopolitical relationships.

"Individuals are questioning the way they want to work. Do they really want to be in the job that they're in or do they really want to be in the relationship they're in?"

"The country and its people are asking big questions."

Mr Salt has forged a national reputation for his insights and has also featured as a regular media columnist for nearly two decades and author of five books.

He will join a list of distinguished Tattersall's Club Business Series speakers, providing a broad view of the trends that will shape the coming years.

"We're going to be a different version of Australia. We've realised that many of the things that shaped Australia in 2019 weren't that flash," Mr Salt said.

"We have discovered a different way of working. And that suits some people a whole lot more.

"We have accelerated the digitisation of Australia. Australians are now more accepting of digital support through use of QR codes, telehealth and the more regular use of apps. We talk more now about supply chain security and self-sufficiency."

Mr Salt will also cast his eye on southeast Queensland and the impact these trends will have on the region.

"This is a new lifestyle," Mr Salt said.

"If you're living near the Gold Coast or Sunshine Coast and traditionally working in Brisbane, then this will suit your lifestyle a lot more.

"We're seeing the rise of the 'Vespers' - the virus escapees seeking a regional lifestyle.

"This will be a different Australia."

Business Series with **CAMERON SMITH AM**

Cameron Smith has revealed how his mentor pushed him out of his comfort zone and on to one of the greatest careers rugby league has ever known.

Mr Smith was the guest speaker at a Tattersall's Club Business series lunch on the eve of the National Rugby League grand finals, revealing the impact of Melbourne Storm coach Craig Bellamy.

Reinforcing Mr Bellamy's focus on the game's fundamentals clearly made him such an important mentor throughout his career, starting with a pre-season campaign early in his career.

"Craig used to take us on these hill runs three times a week and they were torture," Mr Smith said.

"Some players were physically ill before the runs because they knew what was coming.



"After one of my first sessions, Craig pulled me aside and asked me how I thought my pre-season was going so far and I said I thought I was training well, I'm hitting all my times and I'm doing what I've been asked to do and I feel good.

"But Craig thought I was training within myself and told me that I could give a lot more. He knew this because he used to hide behind the trees while we did the hill runs so he could see if any of us were giving less than a full effort.

"He told me the champions are the players who test themselves every day and get out of their comfort zone and hurt physically and mentally, so when that little voice creeps in during big moments they can push it aside. So from that day right up until my last game against Penrith last year, I gave my very best and became comfortable with being uncomfortable."

Mr Smith addressed mentoring, goal-setting, peak performance and leadership during his insightful Business Series lunch address to a sold-out audience.

He had plenty to draw on from a career that has remarkable statistics: the NRL's most-capped player and the only player to ever play more than 400 games; multiple premiership wins with the Storm; and captaining Queensland and Australia to memorable victories.

Mr Smith was part of one of the greatest on-field combinations in modern rugby league with his Storm, Queensland and Australian teammates Cooper Cronk and Billy Slater.

He also spoke of the importance of that partnership and how it stayed ahead of the field for so long, drawing comparisons with teamwork in the corporate field.

"The secret was we challenged each other at training and were always trying to make each other better, the team better, and think of different ways of staying ahead of the opposition," Mr Smith said.

"We all had different strengths and styles to our game which complemented each other really well.

"It's a trio I'm very proud to have been a part of and we were lucky to play alongside each other for a long time, not just at the Storm but also Test matches and State of Origins.

"For all of us to fall into the same team at the same time was remarkable and if it hadn't happened that way for any one of us I don't think the outcome would have been the same."

“We have Members with varying interests who enjoy different parts of the Club for different reasons, and we want to make sure we create value for them for each of these experiences” Mr Clarke said.

Tattersall’s is a Brisbane icon, both physically and historically, and we’re so fortunate to have a tremendous range of assets to suit different Members’ needs.

This is not a one-size fits all approach – the value of Membership is represented by the sum of many parts.

Tattersall’s is always considering ways to improve or adapt new offerings to Members, welcoming feedback. “We’re always looking at continuous improvement, ways we can keep lifting the experience,” Mr Clarke said.

Mentoring PROGRAM

The decadence of Tattersall's Club surrounds is well known to its Members but it's the personal connections that have been at the heart of the Club for more than 150 years.

Mentoring has been central to many of the friendships that have spanned decades at the Club from as far back as the earliest days of Tattersall's. Many Members can recall conversations within Tattersall's that produced advice that had profound benefits for their careers.

Those opportunities are reaching a new level as Tattersall's Club extends its Business Mentoring program and business connectivity opportunities.

Last year, the Club trialled its first official mentoring program aimed at enhancing the business development options for Members.

The program connected mentees aged 25-35 with experienced industry mentors.

The three-month program was focused on the principles of business and lessons learnt rather than specific to the mentee's industry, meaning a lawyer wasn't necessarily matched with a lawyer mentor, for example.

An independent consultant assisted with the pairings to ensure suitable combinations and provide arms-length facilitation.

"As humans, this has been a natural journey in our lifecycles – to pass on learnings and advice to help steer the younger generations. It's an opportunity we proudly embrace within our multi-generational Club as it evolves."

Mentors and mentees provided great insight into their comments about last year's program including:

"It allowed me to focus because it required the discipline to sit down and think ahead, learning from people with more knowledge and setting achievable goals that take you out of your comfort zone."

"We covered topics that you usually would not speak about. Allowing yourself to open up and talk to someone with a different take on something means there is a lot to be gained."

"As a mentor, it assisted me too because I have a son a similar age and it helped me understand my relationship with him at the same time".

Delivering the 'Next Chapter' FOR TATTERSALL'S

Tattersall's Club is taking the next step on the Covid-interrupted journey started three years ago with the unveiling of floor plans for its new contemporary precinct.

Member information sessions were held in August to showcase the plans which will transform the northern side of the Club's first floor.

Tattersall's Club President Michael Paramor AM said the concept was the result of three years of discussion with differing groups of Members regarding the next steps for the Club.

"This began with the considered discussion in 2018 on the membership make-up of Tattersall's Club," Mr Paramor told Members at the information sessions.

"Once that matter was settled, we then moved into asking Members what they wanted of the Club. That sparked our Next Chapter document that was sent to Members in 2019. "The feedback helped us to decide on what infrastructure would be required to provide more for Members. Covid-19 obviously interrupted us in 2020 but it hasn't changed our desire to respond to Members' wishes for the Club."

The early stages have already been completed – a new Concierge area and the returning of space to Members with the opening of business facilities on the Mezzanine level above the Members' Bar.

The next stage is the exciting "two-precinct" concept reflected in the Next Chapter document and endorsed at a Committee meeting in July 2021.

The Club's much-loved Heritage precinct of Members' Bar and Members' Dining Room areas remain untouched. "When you get out of the lift and turn left, you will have a Members' Bar and a Members' Dining Room that will be the same," Mr Paramor said.

"That area is rightly beloved by Members."

The area to the right of the lifts – the Healy Room, the O'Duffy Library and staff offices – will form Tattersall's new contemporary precinct.

Mr Paramor told Members that the Committee had worked closely with the Club's banker Westpac to ensure the project was affordable.

"We are comfortable with our ability to manage this project because we have a strong Balance Sheet and we have carefully planned for this. Westpac has validated our thinking," Mr Paramor said.

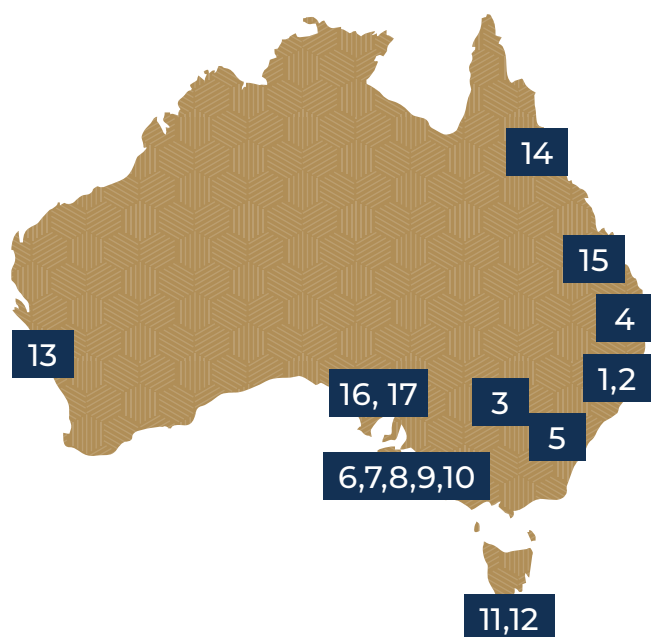

CUP TARGET FOR TATT'S CHAMP



Tattersall's Club will again have a touchpoint with Australia's most famous racing carnival with a horse that his trainer "wouldn't have given two bobs for 12 months ago".

That horse is Incentivise – a five-year-old gelding that stole the show at the Tattersall's Tiara raceday at Eagle Farm in June.

Incentivise was simply stunning as he raced to victory in the \$200,000 Group 3 Tattersall's Cup (2400m), beating his opposition by 12 lengths.

It was among many highlights on the Tiara raceday, which bubbled with fashion, the sight of many Members catching up trackside and the wonderful athletes on the track.

Incentivise's win that had locals scratching their heads for comparisons. When was the last time a horse dominated a Group race in Brisbane with a 12-length win?

Fortunately, there are comparisons for what could come next.

Incentivise has switched to the Melbourne stables of Peter Moody – one of the most popular Tattersall's Club Grill Night guests in recent years – for a tilt at the Caulfield and Melbourne Cup.

It's the same path taken by Vow And Declare, the

gelding part-owned by Queenslanders who claimed the 2019 Tattersall's Cup at Eagle Farm before his stirring Melbourne Cup success a few months later.

But no one saw Incentivise's path to riches. Even his breeder and original trainer Steve Tregoe admitted he didn't think much of the Shamus Award gelding's racing future when he was beaten in a Toowoomba maiden race in March.

After that loss, Incentivise reeled off six consecutive wins including three by more than seven lengths before the Tattersall's Cup stroll.

"For a horse I wouldn't have given two bobs for 12 months ago, I don't know what to say," Tregoe said.

Incentivise recorded a seventh straight win in September when he claimed the Group 1 Makybe Diva Stakes at Flemington, confirming his favouritism for the Caulfield and Melbourne Cups.

The feature Tattersall's Racing Club meeting in June included another memorable moment – dynamic jockey Stephanie Thornton claimed her first Group win when Melbourne sprinter Away Game claimed the \$175,000 Group 3 Eureka Stud W.J. Healy Stakes (1200m).

Thornton has been among the rising stars in Australian sport and her victory in a driving finish from Godolphin mare Exhilarates rounded out another first-class day of winter racing.

The \$600,000 Group 1 Sky Racing Tattersall's Tiara (1400m) was won by Melbourne mare Tofane for jockey Craig Williams and trainer Michael Moroney, following its win in the Stradbroke two weeks earlier. "We very much look forward to seeing.

Incentivise and other runners who have featured at Tattersall's meetings going on to figure in the Melbourne and Sydney spring carnivals.

"Tattersall's Club always cherishes its rich racing history and we were delighted with such a wonderful day of racing and friendship at our Tiara meeting," Tattersall's Club and Tattersall's Racing Club President Michael Paramor AM said.

"Our Club is proud of the legends of the turf that have featured on our racedays over more than 100 years and we are excited at the prospect of Incentivise adding to that list.

"We look forward to seeing our Members at our next raceday at the Gold Coast in November. We are excited about this innovation with our November meeting which will give our Members a chance to spend quality time together ahead of the Christmas season.

"Tattersall's Racing Club extends the friendship opportunities for our Members, combining the love of horse racing with wonderful opportunities to socialise."

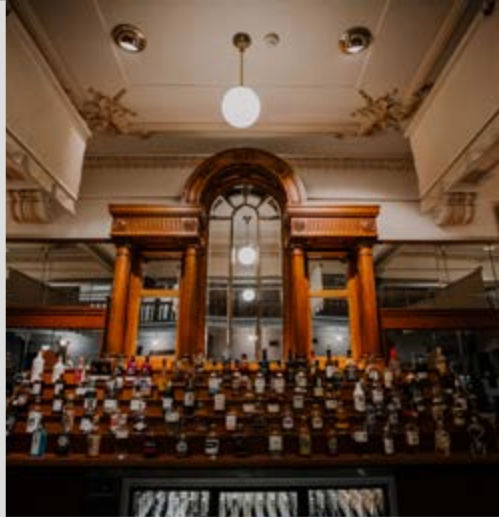

Father and Daughter Dinner WITH PIP COURTNEY

Pip Courtney's beloved father is still a guiding hand in her life, more than two decades after one of Australia's sharpest journalism minds lost a battle with cancer.

Pip has become one of the best-known faces on Australian television through her work on the ABC's Landline program.

Her journalism career was inspired by her father Michael Courtney, a former newspaper editor whose home visitors included Australian political giant Bob Hawke.

The Courtney home in Launceston was a popular spot for a variety of memorable characters who convinced Pip that journalism was the right choice for her.

Pip will tell those stories and more as the guest speaker at Tattersall's Club's annual Father and Daughter Dinner on October 12.

"My father was my hero – Laurie Oakes once told me that he was the best journalist he ever worked with – but that didn't mean we agreed on everything," Pip said.

"Dad was very different to me. I was shy and had a lot to learn about so many things in journalism.

"Dad taught me so much and now I can't imagine not doing the job I'm doing. But I dearly miss the chance to talk to him about it all. We lost him too soon."

Michael Courtney was a man of the city – a razor-sharp journalist at Melbourne's Herald Sun newspaper before he moved to Tasmania to edit the Launceston Examiner.

He made that paper one of the most renowned in the nation for community interaction, developing an engaged and fiercely loyal readership that was the envy of many of the nation's editors.

But Pip was still drawn to her family's strong ties to the land with many relatives enjoying life in agricultural industries.

A teacher asked Pip in Year 7 of what career she would chase, and she declared she would follow her father into journalism.

That waned during her early days in journalism when she was tempted to join her family's love of agriculture by studying wool classing but she remained with the ABC and went on to become the face of its renowned rural coverage.

FITNESS AND THE PANDEMIC: WHAT WE HAVE LEARNT AND WHAT'S TO COME IN THE POST-PANDEMIC ERA

The global pandemic has forced many of us to change the way we exercise and work out. With many fitness facilities forced to close at short notice due to snap lockdowns, people are searching for alternative ways to maintain their fitness, health and wellbeing. So, we are not only witnessing a shift in how and why people exercise, but also developing an understanding about what people value within the fitness industry. Here are the top five fitness trends we anticipate in the aftermath of the global pandemic.

1. GROUP FITNESS TRAINING

People are social beings. We like to be around, and bond, with like-minded people. It is precisely this reason why group fitness training has played such a central role in the fitness industry over the years.

Strictly speaking, group fitness training is exercising with five or more people and different from 1:1 personal training. Group fitness is a great way to stay motivated and accountable, whilst also having a bit of fun.

Because of government restrictions in response to the pandemic, we have seen a general decline in group training. It is expected that we will see a much greater demand for group training as the globe opens up again and people seek out more social interaction.

2. ONLINE/ON-DEMAND TRAINING

With group training impossible and regular gym-goers forced to work out from home, it is to be expected that the online fitness space has expanded at a much faster rate than would have been anticipated pre-pandemic.

This field is growing from the introduction of online one-on-one personal/small group sessions to the emergence of on-demand fitness platforms provided by corporations such as Peloton and Apple Fitness+.

It is anticipated that the online fitness space will continue to rise in popularity and will likely work in tandem with physical fitness environments as we move into a post-pandemic era.

3. WELLNESS PROGRAMS IN & OUT OF THE GYM

Before the pandemic, we started to see a greater level of corporate responsibility attached to employee health and wellbeing.

Over the last few years, employers have gone beyond the helpful one-off or annual "wellbeing allowance" to providing employees with direct tools to focus on their physical and mental health. These tools have included corporate gym memberships, on-site group fitness classes and bespoke wellbeing programs.

The global pandemic has caused some businesses to

temporarily close, and government restrictions have meant employers and employees have had to adapt to flexible working arrangements.

With flexible working arrangements expected to be around long-term, there is greater collaboration expected between fitness facilities and corporates to expand upon wellness programs offered to employees. It would not surprise if these programs included offerings such as wellness testing, life coaching and mindfulness workshops.

4. HIGH INTENSITY INTERVAL TRAINING (HIIT)

HIIT training is an exercise regime that typically features periods of high-intensity exercises in between intervals of low-intensity training (recovery).

Why is HIIT so popular? Because it is short, requires limited space and equipment, burns calories fast and has a fantastic EPOC effect (that is, you continue to burn calories at a high rate post-exercise).

HIIT training has been integrated into the fitness programs of countless gyms around Brisbane in recent

years. Personal trainers and digital fitness platforms have heavily incorporated the style of training into their online offering, particularly during lockdowns. This trend of HIIT training is expected to continue in the post-pandemic era.

5. WEARABLE TECHNOLOGY

Since its introduction, wearable exercise technology has become big business.

Smart watches, heart rate monitors and GPS trackers mean every aspect of fitness can be captured, recorded and projected to assist the user in reaching goals. And, beyond all that, they can just be really fun too.

With the pandemic encouraging greater outdoor exercise and home workouts, wearables have become even more desirable to effectively track performance in real-time and keep the motivation alive. Expect the consumer market to continue to grow rapidly.
